## 5th GPAJ Refugee Crisis Workshop

Date: Friday, June 3, 2022, 20:00-22:00 (Japan time)

Speaker: Ms. Watanage Kankolongo Sayaka, Representative of WELgee

Theme: WELgee's activities to support refugees and refugee-applicants



## Summary:

The 5th workshop invited Ms. Watanabe Kankolongo Sayaka, as a guest speaker. As Representative of WELgee, she has been actively engaged in supports to refugees and refugeestatus applicants in Japan. In the 5th workshop, WELgee's activities were presented and discussion among participants followed,

## (Presentation by Ms. Watanabe)

The adoption ratio of refugee applicants is less than 1% in Japan, and it takes 4 years and 4 months in average to receive the results of refugee screening. While many refugees have outstanding abilities, such as multi-language skill, or expertise as engineers, IT programmers, business managers, entrepreneurs, and university professors, their abilities are not utilized for long years until screening process is completed, leaving them in a state of physical and mental disarray. WELgee launched JobCopass program in 2017 to create a space for job-matching for those talented refugees and refugee applicants. So far, 15 companies have hired refugee applicants on a full-time basis through JobCopass program. WELgee intends to further develop this program and expand job opportunities in the future. In order to facilitate this initiative, WELgee creates a monthly-supporter system and encourages professionals to join this program as mentors. WELgee expects your participation and assistance.

## (Discussion)

Following the lecture, Ms. Watanabe and participants engaged in a lively exchange of opinions. Major topics discussed were as follows: refugee screening process in Japan (reasons of taking a long time for completing screening), relaxation of strict refugee screening in Japan (obstacles of relaxation), business modality to promote this initiative (comparative advantages of establishing a general incorporated association and an NPO), how to support 'unskilled' refugees, the tolerance of Japanese society to foreigners and the future of Japanese society (how to create a society in relation with refugees, foreign labors and immigrants), the settlement of foreigners in Japan (not as a worker, but as a habitant who lives in Japanese society).
